The Gilbert & George Centre, was founded in 2017 by Gilbert & George to create a permanent exhibition space for the artist's legacy and is intended to enrich London's cultural offering. The Centre is committed to being accessible to everyone in the community and in keeping with Gilbert & George's 'Art for All' vision, admission to the Centre is free entry. Donations from visitors and interested parties will always be gratefully accepted and directly applied to the running and upkeep of the Centre.

Located in the Spitalfields neighbourhood in London's East End, a place now widely associated with Gilbert & George and their art, the gallery provides visitors with an in-depth insight into the world of Gilbert & George. In the artists words: "The East End is the centre of the universe. Some artists feel they have to move to be inspired, but we never felt we needed to."

Built in the early 19th century, the building originally served as a brewery. Converted by SIRS Architects, who were awarded a prestigious RIBA London Award in 2025, the restoration process focused on preserving many of its original features, with the respect for the rich history and the architectural landscape of the area, while prioritising sustainability and future-proofing.

## WHO ARE GILBERT & GEORGE?

Gilbert and George are two men who together are one artist: Gilbert & George. Gilbert was born in the Dolomites, Italy in 1943 and, George was born in Devon, UK in 1942.

Gilbert & George first met at Saint Martin's School of Art in London, in 1967. From the very beginning, they have appeared as figures in their own art. They are widely known for their early 'Living Sculpture' performance – first performed in 1969, and their groups of pictures, of which they have created almost 3,000 works since 1971 exploring themes of 'DEATH, HOPE, LIFE, FEAR, SEX, MONEY, RACE, RELIGION.'

The inspiration and subject of the art of Gilbert & George is modern life, frequently addressing themes from social issues and taboos to artistic conventions. Gilbert & George take their places in the visionary landscape of their art both as participants and witnesses. The vision of Gilbert & George is committed to raw realism, but it is also deeply romantic – finding heightened or disturbed emotion in ordinary things. In every picture or 'Living Sculpture', Gilbert & George convey images of the modern world with great intensity and contradiction. This precisely balanced paradox encourages the viewer to question life and art within themselves, and others.

Turner Prize winners in 1986, to date Gilbert & George have exhibited internationally with over 100 solo museum and public gallery exhibitions, and represented the UK in the 51st Venice Biennale in 2005.

# DEATH HOPE LIFE FEAR....

The Gilbert & George Centre presents 'DEATH HOPE LIFE FEAR...' – an exhibition of 18 pictures created by Gilbert & George that span the years 1984 to 1998. The exhibition brings together the epic quadripartite picture 'DEATH HOPE LIFE FEAR', created in 1984, from which the exhibition takes its title, alongside a unique selection of works from Gilbert & George's 'NEW DEMOCRATIC PICTURES' (1991) and 'RUDIMENTARY PICTURES' (1998) – some of which have not been in exhibited in the UK for more than two decades. The period covered in this exhibition was one of immense seismic shift in the vision as art of Gilbert & George.

From their very beginnings, Gilbert & George have sought to express in their art the fundamentals of human existence: the universal truths as they see them of the modern condition. The title of this exhibition, 'DEATH HOPE LIFE FEAR...' is therefore descriptive of the subjects surveyed by the art of Gilbert & George, and the feelings that may be evoked by those subjects within the individual, who as such 'completes' the picture, each in their own way.
